
# **Bard Graduate Center Research Guide: Ancient and Medieval China (to c. 1000 C.E.)**








This guide lists resources for researching the arts and material culture of ancient and medieval imperial China, to c. 1000 C.E. This time period begins with the neolithic and bronze ages (c. 4000 - 200 B.C.E.) and continues through the end of the Five Dynasties period (960 C.E.), including the Xia, Shang, Zhou, Han, and T'ang dynasties.

Although art history and material archaeology resources are emphasized, research on this topic is very interdisciplinary, and some resources for history, philosophy, religion, and literature are also included in the guide.





# Princeton University Art Museum: Bronze Casting

The Princeton University Art Museum has developed a great animated website that illustrates how ancient Chinese cast bronze objects were made:

# • Asian Historical Architecture

A photographic survey of Asia's architectural heritage with over 17,500 photos and virtual tours of 848 sites in twenty-one countries, including China. The website is a non-profit collection of photos from many different contributors.

### The Yale Silk Road Database

The Yale Silk Road Database presents over 11,000 images of major sites in the Silk Road region taken during faculty site seminars led by Mimi Hall Yiengpruksawan (Professor, History of Art) under the auspices of the Council on East Asian Studies at Yale University in the summers of 2006-2010.

# • Patricia Buckley Ebrey's Visual Sourcebook of Chinese Civilization

This teaching resource for teachers of Chinese history, compiled by an eminent scholar of the field, includes a database of images of Chinese material culture, categorized by chronological period and topic. The section for the ancient world concentrates on tomb objects.

Important research databases for ancient and medieval China

#### Bibliography of Asian Studies

BAS is the most widely-used database for all topics of Asian studies, including ancient and medieval China. It contains more than 800,000 records on all subjects (especially humanities and social sciences) pertaining to East, Southeast, and South Asia published worldwide from 1971 to the present, referencing principally western-language articles and book chapters. Of note for material culture and ancient China, the indexing of Artibus Asiae, Archives of Asian Art, Early China, and Journal of Asian Studies are "fast-tracked" in this database, and most of the other journals listed in this LibGuide as most important for the field are also at least partially indexed here.

# Society for the Study of Early China (SSEC)

The Society for the Study of Early China (SSEC), established in 1975, is a scholarly, non-political, and non-profit professional association open to all persons interested in the culture and civilization of China from earliest times down to and including the period of the Han dynasty [AD 220 (CE)]. The Society publishes the annual journal Early China as well as the Early China Special Monograph Series and maintains the Early China website.

Established on 1st August in 1950, the Institute of Archaeology was one of the earliest research institutes of the Chinese Academy of Sciences. 

# Other Online Resources for the material culture of ancient and medieval China



#### China Historical GIS

The China Historical Geographic Information System, CHGIS, project was launched in January 2001 to establish a database of populated places and historical administrative units for the period of Chinese history

between 221 BCE and 1911 CE. CHGIS provides a base GIS platform for researchers to use in spatial analysis, temporal statistical modeling, and representation of selected historical units as digital maps. Having downloaded the CHGIS datasets, the user can search the database for administrative units and capitals for any given time in Chinese history, can create customized digital maps for particular times and places, or can join their own datasets for spatial analysis, thematic mapping, or other specialized statistical modeling according to their own interests. The CHGIS project has received major funding from the Henry Luce Foundation and the National Endowment for the Humanities and additional assistance from Harvard Yenching Institute and Harvard Asia Center.

# • IDP, The International Dunhuang Project: The Silk Road Online

IDP is an international collaboration to make information and images of all manuscripts, paintings, textiles and artefacts from Dunhuang and archaeological sites of the Eastern Silk Road freely available on the Internet and to encourage their use through educational and research programmes. IDP partner institutions which both provide data for and act as hosts to the multilingual website and database are: The British Library, London; The National Library of China, Beijing; The Institute for Oriental Manuscripts, St Petersburg; Ryukoku University, Kyoto; The Berlin-Brandenburg Academy of Science and Humanities; The Dunhuang Academy, Dunhuang; Bibliothèque nationale de France, Paris; and the Research Institute of Korean Studies, Seoul. Major IDP partners providing data include: The Library of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences, Budapest; The British Museum, London; The Victoria & Albert Museum, London; The Museum for Asian Art, Berlin; and Guimet Museum, Paris.
